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Bespoke Document Storage Solution

The Customer

For the last decade Sentinel Secure Holdings Ltd (SSHL) has provided a premium document storage and archive management service to London's business community. Customers include law firms, international banks, architects and the media. This premium service includes a retrieval and delivery facility within a guaranteed two-hour time limit anywhere in central London.

The Challenge

Following a compulsory purchase order served on their Stratford premises last year to make way for the new fast track Channel Tunnel link to St. Pancras, a decision was made to consolidate all five of SSHL's document storage centres under one roof. The challenge was to find a suitable location close to the City, and to select a company capable of designing, manufacturing and installing a bespoke storage solution for the millions of boxes of archive documents. To compound the challenge the boxes need to be stored in a way that allows for easy retrieval as well as maximising the number stored.

To complicate matters further the chosen location, a new 11,191m² purpose built warehouse adjacent to the A2 in the Kidbrooke area, was not going to be finished before the D-day imposed

by the compulsory purchase order to move out of Stratford. Consequently, an interim storage warehouse in Deptford was required, in which the chosen storage supplier would also be required to install racking and shelving.

Andrew Simmons, Operations Director for SSHL put the contract out to tender to his existing supplier and all of the leading storage solution providers. "We needed a partner, rather than a supplier," he explained. "We were under pressure from the compulsory purchase order and the situation demanded a swift reaction. We were looking for a storage partner we could completely trust to get on with the job quickly."

The Solution

LINPAC Storage Systems won the contract: Andrew Simmons explained the

The Installation

With such a tight schedule, work began on the storage solution for the interim location from the date of order. "Downtime was exceptionally low" remarked Simmons, "We had to move and re-store

4,000 tonnes of documents in 33 days into the temporary warehouse – looking back it was madness but with the help of LINPAC Storage Systems we achieved it."

Now that the new building is finished, Phase I of the Apex racking and shelving is complete. Phase 2 is being built and there is one more phase to go culminating in a state of the art document storage centre capable of holding over two million boxes of archive documents.

Phase I consists of 40 rows of back to back Apex racking in a multi-tier arrangement with five in-rack floors. The boxes themselves are stored in a double-deep arrangement, two high per shelf. The height of the racking varies with the

roof pitch to maximise the cubic capacity of the warehouse, rising to 15.5 metres storing up to 54 boxes high on 27 shelves. Each floor is accessed via a permanent lift built to hold three roll cages to transport the boxes.

To brighten the environment within the warehouse the paint scheme of the storage solution is a special light grey. Open steel mesh flooring helps to increase the light and ensures that in the event of a fire smoke will be seen as it rises to the floor above. Intelligent zonal fire sprinkler systems have been installed on each level.
